

THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION (1775 - 1783) – LESSON 2

Objective: To examine the strengths and weaknesses of the Continental and British armies.

Do Now:

The Continental Army had many problems and few advantages. However, the Continentals did have at least one important advantage.

Home field advantage is important in both sports and war. In sports, the home team has better knowledge of the field and/or stadium. In war, the side fighting on home turf has a greater knowledge of the land. In sports, the home team has the support of their fans. In war, the side fighting at home has the support of their citizens. In both sports and war, the team or army on the road may have had to travel a long distance and would rather be home. The side playing or fighting in their own territory is comfortable with their surroundings and has more to fight for.

Continental Army

Disadvantages

- no navy
- untrained soldiers
- few cannons and little gunpowder

Advantages

- fighting for their homes and freedom
- leadership of George Washington

British Army

Advantages

- highly trained, experienced soldiers
- plentiful weapons and supplies
- most powerful navy in the world

Disadvantages

- the war was fought far from home
- less reasons to fight hard
- risked constant attack

Battle of Bunker Hill

- Occurred on Breeds Hill on June 17, 1775.
- The Patriots were short on gunpowder and were warned by Colonel William Prescott,...

... "Don't fire till you see the whites of their eyes!"

- The British won the battle, but lost over 1,000 troops.
- This battle showed Britain that the Patriots would not be an easy enemy.
